





Greetings From Shoreline Interfaith!

As the new Director at Shoreline Neighborhood Outreach Program I would like to thank all of you at North Shore Congregational Church for all of your support for the older adults in our community. Since 1986 you have partnered with Interfaith Older Adult Programs by providing volunteers, financial support and prayers to help older adults remain independent in their own homes and connected to their neighborhood.

During 2016, Shoreline Interfaith touched the lives of 400 older adults in our neighborhood. Approximately 84% of our clients are female, at least 68% live alone, 64% are age 80 or older, and 25% have incomes under \$15,000 a year. Services are provided by 137 passionate volunteers from ten supporting congregations. Volunteers and staff assisted clients with free transportation to medical appointments and grocery shopping, advocacy, birthday cards, telephone visits, in person visits, information and referrals, paperwork assistance, and minor home chores/repairs. If you are 60 years old or older, or caring for a loved one, and need assistance, please call our office.

Shoreline Interfaith is in urgent need of volunteer drivers to take an older adult to medical appointments or grocery shopping. If you are retired, a stay-at-home parent with kids in school, have a day off during the week, or a college student, please consider volunteering as a driver. We also need an occasional volunteer willing to shovel snow for a senior who cannot afford a service. If you are looking for that "feel good" experience and want to learn more about all of our volunteering opportunities, please contact me.

MEDICATION AND ALCOHOL

There may still be a few Holiday parties in the New Year, or perhaps you may be taking a "hot toddy" or two to warm your bones from winter's chill or when those sniffles arise.

Get to know the

But alcohol in combination with prescription drugs and many over-the-counter drugs, can be a danger to your health and well-being. Over 100 medications can interact with all types of alcohol, including beer, wine and spirits. Problems can range from just bothersome, such as headaches and nausea, to a life-threatening event such as internal bleeding or difficulty breathing.

Whether you take medications long-term or just a short course, it is important to question your doctor or pharmacist about any reactions if you plan to drink. However, few people realize there could be a danger taking an over-the-counter product. One of the most critical interactions is the combination of the pain-reliever acetaminophen (Tylenol) and alcohol. Both are metabolized by the liver. Older adults are more likely to be at risk because the body's ability to break down alcohol slows with age. Older adults are also more likely to be taking one or more medications, which may also be metabolized more slowly.

The most common drug/drink interactions are with the medication categories of: antianxiety drugs, antihistamines, blood pressure meds, muscle relaxants, opioid pain relievers, and medications for sleep. When combined with alcohol, the major risks are drowsiness, dizziness, and with some, slowed or difficult breathing.

Some antibiotics lose effectiveness in the presence of alcohol, or may cause nausea, vomiting or flushing. Statins for lowering cholesterol are broken down in the liver, as is alcohol, which may become a serious risk. Prolonged use or taking large doses of NSAID's (non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs), such as aspirin, ibuprofen (Advil, Motrin) and naproxen (Aleve) are irritating to the lining of the stomach (as is alcohol) with the ultimate risk of ulcers or internal bleeding.

Take a look at your medication bottles and read the cautionary notes, and have a chat with your pharmacist or health care provider if you have any concerns. And look up recipes for "Mocktails" if you choose to go alcohol-free.
