I remember, in the time we spent at a cabin in SW Massachusetts each summer as a child, how often there would be a puzzle sitting out on a card table, for days on end. We would pick away at the puzzle here and there until, slowly, piece by piece, the final picture would come together. It is a memory and image to which I often look when I consider the life and ministry of the church (the metaphorical applications are numerous), but most recently I have found myself focused on the nature of the 'fit' of each single piece of the puzzle.

It doesn't matter if it is a 10 piece-puzzle for a toddler, a 100 piece puzzle for a family with children, or a 5000 piece masterpiece that only the most patient and enduring among us would choose to tackle, every single piece, in every one of the puzzles, has just one true 'fit.' In each puzzle, there is one place that is 'just right' and helps to make everything else come together. I think that image has a lot to say about our life in the church.

Now – don't get me wrong. The metaphor can quickly be pushed too far. I think there are often multiple places that are right for us at any given time, and I know that what is right for our service in the life of the church, today, is quite possibly very different than what it might be in a year, two tears, five years, and on... But, the simple truth is that there IS a fit. There IS a place (or places), for each of us, in which our interests, capacities, gifts, faith and discipleship merge to allow us to be an integral part in the life of the church while, simultaneously, we are being fed in our own journeys of faith. For each of us, there is 'fit' in the ministries of our congregation.

Later in this newsletter you will find a wonderful article provided by our Stewardship Board on the stewardship of our time and talents in the life of the church. In the coming weeks you will begin to see information from our Nominating Committee, on Sundays, that will discuss the various formal positions available in our church boards and leadership. As spring progresses, you will begin to hear about some

conversations in regard to ways to enhance board membership that are currently being held by our Church Council. And then, in future months, you will likely begin hearing about different ministries, each month, as we seek to more fully inform the congregation of all of the ministries going on in the life of the church.

All of this is towards one goal — to help you find your fit! As you see the information of the Nominating Committee in the coming weeks, consider whether or not one of these boards is the right place for you, right now, to engage in the life of the church. As you hear more and more about the ministries of the church, be open to the 'nudging' of God's Spirit within you, and seek to discover your fit in the life of the church. It may be on a board, it may be in a benevolence project, it may be in music, it may be in one place, it may be in many, but there is somewhere you 'fit' in the life of the church — and we need you. I pray that you will be open to those possibilities in the months ahead and step in to be a part of what God is doing in the life of North Shore Congregational Church!





HELPS FROM THE HEALTH COMMITTEE

THE SKINNY ON FAT

Fat is one of the three essential nutrients (along with protein and carbohydrate) needed for good health. Dietary fat provides vitamins D, E and K, and stores and provides energy.

While fat contains almost twice the calories per gram over protein and carbohydrate, it has an important place in our diet. It is essential to note that intake of excess calories from



any source - fat, carbs or protein - will result in weight gain if calories are not burned during exercise. Likewise, consuming low-fat or fat-free foods are not usually a good thing if other additives such as sugar and salt are present.

Here are the types of fats, and where to find healthy sources:

MONOUNSATURATED - a good fat

- reduces LDL (bad) cholesterol levels when consumed in place of saturated fats
- found in olive oil, canola oil, peanut oil, nuts, olives and avocados

POLYUNSATURATED - a good fat

- includes omega 3 and omega 6 fatty acids (omega 3 is preferable)
- reduces LDL (bad) cholesterol, raises HDL (good) cholesterol
- found in salmon, tuna, herring, sardines, trout, ground flasseed, walnuts, flasseed oil, canola oil

SATURATED - ok when used in moderation

- are solid at room temperature
- large amounts may increase LDL cholesterol
- animal sources: butter and high fat dairy products, lard, high fat meats
- plant sources: palm kernel oil and coconut oil

TRANS FAT - to be avoided

- increases LDL, decreases HDL
- found in stick margarine, solid vegetable shortening, high-fat processed foods and commercially baked products

Check food product labels and reach for the right fats.

BENEVOLENCE SPOTLIGHT

Habitat for Humanity/Ozaukee

Mission:

Habitat for Humanity works in partnership with God and people everywhere, from all walks of life, to develop communities with people in need by building and renovating houses so that there are decent houses in decent communities in which every person can experience God's love and can live and grow into all that God intends.

Habitat for Humanity®

Current Projects:

Grafton, WI:

A single family house on Columbia Road is to be completed in early summer 2016. A Duplex on the same site will be started in 2017.

Port Washington, WI:

Habitat for Humanity Ozaukee is partnering with Thrivent Financial through a grant through Thrivent Build Homes program of \$45,000. This will cover about half of the building's cost. The grant is to be used this year, therefore the house must be finished and ready for occupancy by **December 31, 2016.**

The current plans for the home on Park Street (Thrivent home) are for a handicap accessible, ranch style home with three bedrooms. Another home will be built after this one and is also on Park Street—to be finished in 2017.

Habitat for Humanity requires the resident live or work in the home's county and that he or she can afford it. The home is not given to the recipient. They have a 30 year, zero interest mortgage equal to the building costs. The resident must be able to afford monthly payments and is also required to give 500 volunteer hours on Habitat projects (their own home or another).

NACCC YEAR ROUND DELEGATE REPORT

As your Year Round Delegate to the National Association of Congregational Christian Churches (NACCC) my "job description" has two parts. The first is to provide periodic updates through this Newsletter and to the Council about events, services, and opportunities available through the Association. The second part of being a Year Round Delegate is to take feedback or questions from the congregation back to the NACCC. The Year Round Delegate is not necessarily the Delegate to the Annual Meetings, although I was glad to serve at the 2015 Annual Meeting.

I have mentioned that the 2016 NACCC Annual Meeting & Conference will be June 25-28 at the DoubleTree by Hilton Detroit/Dearborn. The theme will be "Who Is My Neighbor?" (Luke 10:29) Registration, Hotel, Meeting, and Conference information is available on the NACCC web site. The direct link is http://www.naccc.org/2016-amc-information.html. It is not too early to think about attending.

So, what is the Meeting & Conference, and why would a member from our church want to attend? There are three business sessions, each lasting about two hours, spread over the four days. During these, the attendees hear about the business of the NACCC and the delegates vote to ratify, or not, the actions taken by the Board and the Leadership Council over the past year. These sessions are a great opportunity to learn how the NACCC is doing. Much of the rest of the time is workshops and presentations to learn

Update on Confirmation Class for March!


