Dear Friends,

By the time you read this message, our role of hosting the 2017 Leadership Summit of the Wisconsin Congregational Association will likely be upon us, if not already past. It is a weekend that is sure to include inspiring conversation, meaningful reflection and genuine fellowship among members and leaders of our churches around the state of Wisconsin. It will be a weekend of great food (thanks to our hospitality team led by Rick Bauzenberger, Norm Christensen and Su Davison), great music (some of which will be led by the worship band of Faith Community Church), inspiring worship (that we have the privilege of hosting), and thoughtful dialog about the present and future of the church. It will also, however, be a palpable reminder of the wider fellowship of which we are part in our Congregational Way of being a church.

So much of our understanding of the Congregational tradition centers around a focus on the autonomy of each local church. The lack of ecclesiastical hierarchies allows our church to be ‘self-governed.’ We aren’t required to subscribe to tenets brought down from a governing body, nor to submit to the will of any outside authority (save that of the authority of Christ as the head of the Church). This is a central notion of our tradition and is, often, the very first thing we note as distinct about who we are as a community of faith.

Often missed in the midst of all of that, however, is that central to our autonomy in the local church is our voluntary fellowship with other Congregational churches. While we may not be part of a denominational hierarchy, and don’t submit to the will or dictates of outside authorities, a core piece of our tradition is to embrace fellowship with one another for cooperation, support and shared ministry. Often missed in our focus on autonomy is the necessity of this very fellowship with other churches – a fellowship that is meant to broaden our ministries through shared work, strengthen our foundations through mutual support and expand our horizons

through counsel and advice. Our tradition is one that is built around the core autonomy of the local church, but it is one that rests that autonomy on the strength and wisdom that is gained through the fellowship we share with other churches – a fellowship we seek to make real through programs such as the Leadership Summit at hand.

In the coming months, you are likely to continue to hear more and more about the wider fellowship of which we are a part. We have a long history of members serving in various position of these associations (which continues with Rick Bauzenberger in his current role on the Congregational Foundation of the NACCC), our own Rev. Julie will be assuming her role, at this year's Leadership Summit, as the Moderator of the Wisconsin Congregational Association, and (assuming the current nominating slate is approved) I will begin a four-year tenure on the Board of Directors of our National Association of Congregational Christian Churches this June. As these opportunities for ongoing and increased participation in these associations go on, I ask that you pray for these fellowships, open your hearts and minds to opportunities to participate in these fellowships in the future, and pray for the leaders who seek to foster greater health in the associations (and through that the local churches) throughout the year.

Our associations have work to do – of that there is no doubt. But, they remain a firm core of the promising future of the Congregational Way, and I ask that you join in prayerfully supporting their efforts as they seek to discern what this fellowship can and should look like in 2017 and beyond.

Celebrating the Ministries of NSCC



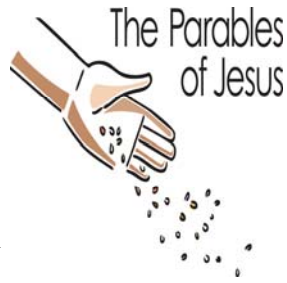

Wednesday, from 7-8pm. You are welcome to join in at any point along the way. If you have any questions, please contact Rev. Marty.



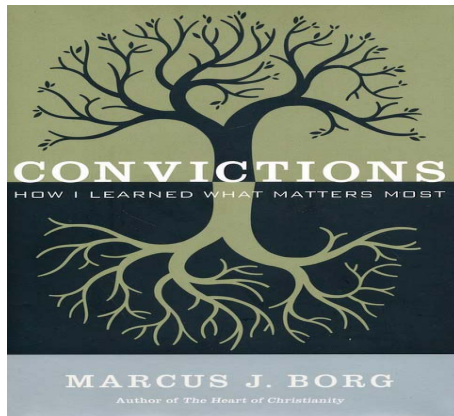
Thursday Morning Bible Study

SAFE SPRING CLEANING

Warmer and sunnier days spur us on to open windows and doors and, yes, get to cleaning and refreshing our homes, garages and gardens.

Safety First is key in stepping onto ladders, reaching those high shelves and lifting heavy items, but do you consider safety as well in the products you use? Many cleaning products, especially the multitude of liquids and sprays, wipes, etc. are often petroleum-based and contain VOC's (volatile organic compounds). These cleaners are irritating to skin, eyes and the nervous system, and also contribute to air and water pollution. Ammonia and chlorinated products (bleach) produce toxic vapors.



Fortunately, there several products available that are non-toxic vegetable-based (sometimes designated 'earth-friendly'), just as effective, safe to use, and gentle on the environment. Some brands to look for are: Seventh Generation, Bi-O-Kleen, Green Works, and others. Check labels. Better yet, you can make your own all-purpose cleaner easily and cheaply. The simplest is to fill a spray bottle with 50:50 white vinegar to water. I like to add a capful of Dr Bronner's liquid soap, or a few drops of lavender or tea tree essential oil (both have natural anti-fungal and antibacterial properties). I also refer to my favorite cleaning hints guru, Linda Cobb, author of the Queen of Clean books.

If you or a family member is prone to allergies it is best, however, to avoid all fragrances. (Which brings to mind the myriad of noxious room deodorizers, scented sprays, candles, etc. - a healthier option to use here is the Fresh Wave line). Recently the FDA has banned the ingredients in antibacterial soaps, but have the remainder of the year to comply. They are deemed to add to the problem of antibiotic resistance and are no more beneficial than plain soap and water.

You might also take inventory and get rid of unused items in your medicine cabinet, basement or garage. Be aware that many of these, including medicines, petroleum-based cleaners, paint and craft items, lawn care products, and many others are considered, and should be properly disposed of, as hazardous waste.

Do not throw them in the trash or pour down a drain. Go to the MMSD web page and search for Home Hazmat Collection. It lists categories of items and proper disposal of each. Download the 2017 flyer for disposal dates and locations; some are held near your neighborhood through the year.

Stephen Ministry – Back to Basics

Established at NSCC in 2006

What Is Stephen Ministry?

Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ (Galatians 6:2, NRSV).

Stephen Ministry is one-to-one lay caring ministry.

Stephen Ministry congregations equip and empower lay caregivers—called Stephen Ministers—to provide high-quality, confidential, Christ-centered care to people who are hurting.

How Stephen Ministry Works

The best way to understand how Stephen Ministry works is to learn about three groups of people involved in this ministry: Stephen Leaders, Stephen Ministers, and care receivers.

Stephen Leaders

Stephen Leaders establish and direct Stephen Ministry in a congregation. They—

- build awareness of Stephen Ministry within the congregation and community
- recruit and train Stephen Ministers
- meet with potential care receivers to assess their needs
- match care receivers with Stephen Ministers
- provide Stephen Ministers with ongoing supervision and continuing education

People learn to serve as Stephen Leaders by attending a Leader's Training Course—a one-week conference that introduces the resources used to lead Stephen Ministry, develops key skills, and gets people excited about this caring ministry. Most congregations begin with two to four Stephen Leaders, typically including a pastor, possibly another church staff person, and one or more lay leaders.

Stephen Ministers—Lay caregivers trained in the congregation by Stephen Leaders.

Stephen Ministers are congregation members trained by Stephen Leaders to offer high-quality, one-to-one

Christian care to people going through tough times. A Stephen Minister usually provides care to one person at a time, meeting with that person once a week for about an hour. Twice a month, Stephen Ministers gather with their Stephen Leaders for supervision and continuing education.

Care Receivers—People going through tough times who are being cared for by Stephen Ministers.

Care receivers are people—congregation members and others in the community—who receive care from a Stephen Minister. These are people struggling through a difficult time in life—experiencing grief, divorce, job loss, chronic or terminal illness, or some other life crisis.

Some important guidelines for this caring relationship protect both the care receiver and the Stephen Minister:

The relationship between a care receiver and a Stephen Minister is confidential.

Men are matched with men; women with women.

When a care receiver's needs exceed what a Stephen Minister can provide, the Stephen Ministry team makes a referral to an appropriate mental health professional or other community resource.

The Blessings of Stephen Ministry

Stephen Ministry multiplies blessings throughout the church and community.

Congregations receive a practical and powerful way to respond to Christ's commandment: "Love one another as I have loved you" (John 15:12 RSV).

Pastors have a *team* of trained, and committed lay caregivers ready to minister to hurting people

Laypeople nurture and use their gifts in meaningful ministry, growing spiritually as they serve others.

People who are hurting have a compassionate companion—a caring Christian friend who provides emotional and spiritual support.

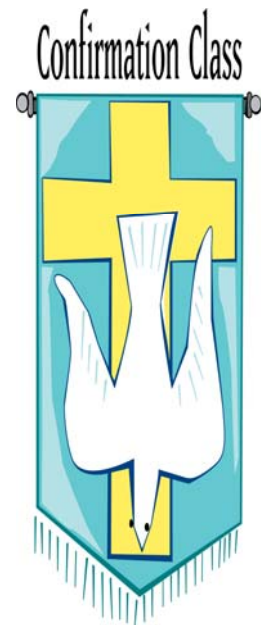
CONFIRMATION CLASS UPDATE
