Voting on Faith...

Dear Friends,

Allow me to start, this time, with outlining the fundamental premise of that which I want to express in this month's message. Stated simply – the separation of church and state has absolutely nothing to do with your vote next week! Now, allow me to say a little more...

Unless you have been living in depths of a mile-deep cave located somewhere on the far side of Mars – you, like all the rest of us, are painfully aware of highly charged, highly contested, media-circus of an election in which we will take part on November 8, 2016. From President to dog-catcher, our ballots will be full of individuals who are seeking our support for their respective positions in our governmental system. Some will lean red, some blue, and a few other will have a purple hue, but there they will be – names on a card on which we have to make a choice. And, that's where my point comes in.

It may seem silly to say it, but I feel particularly compelled to remind us all that the separation of church and state has absolutely nothing to do with your vote next week! The simple truth is that the vast majority of us walk into that polling place riddled with baggage. We walk into that poll loaded down with political affiliations, social justice perceptions, financial considerations, legal viewpoints, constitutional perspectives, personal relationships, and a host of other things that ramble through (or perhaps keep any other thoughts from inkling into) our brains. But, all too often, we forget our faith. Whether we realize it or not, we walk into those booths carrying our checkbooks, investment portfolios, accreditation cards, voter registration cards, and a dozen other things that guide our thoughts and considerations and, all the while, we leave our faith sitting at home!

Far too many of us have grown increasingly comfortable with the notion of allowing our national commitment to a separation of church and state to become the practical equivalent of a separation between faith and voting. When we finally get past our absurd focus on who has the better hair, we focus on fiscal policies, trade policies, social policies and a

plethora of other matters that make a real difference in the world in which we live. We focus on these perspectives of the candidates and weigh which of those available to us more fully fit that which we believe is best. How often do we ask ourselves, however, how well those very beliefs fit into our understanding of Scripture? How often do we seek consistency between the message of the candidates and the message of our faith?

It is not my wish, my desire, nor my place to push anyone in the direction of any candidate in any particular race. It is my wish, my desire, and my place, however, to remind us all that our faith is not only allowed, but belongs in that voting booth! No matter who you are leaning towards, and no matter what you are thinking as you consider the selections you will make in so many important elections on November 8, I implore to take the time to test your own perspectives.

Prior to the election, ask yourself two questions:

- * Are you making this vote because it is what you think?
- Are you making this vote because it is what you believe serves the purposes of God in our world?

I suggest that, if the answer to either of those questions is 'no,' for any one of us, we have some re-thinking to do.





BENEVOLENCE SPOTLIGHT THANKSGIVING SPECIAL OFFERING

Two of the local missions North Shore Congregational Church supports are Lad Lake and Helping Hands Healing Hooves. Both of these missions will also be the recipients of our Special Offering this Thanksgiving.

Lad Lake considers itself to be the "emergency room of the child welfare system." Ninety-five percent of the young people it serves come from families in crisis that are unable to offer their children the support they need due to poverty, family instability, abuse or neglect. Lad Lake counselors provide young people safety,



individualized therapy and training to build the skills they will need to become independent. The residential treatment program and school for troubled boys age 9 to 18 are located on 365 rural acres in Dousman. The St. Rose campus in Milwaukee offers housing and treatment for girls age 12 to 18 who have severe emotional and behavioral issues. Lad Lake also offers off-site mentoring services, as well as independent living resources for young adults. Lad Lake serves 1100 to 1500 young people each year.

Helping Hands Healing Hooves (HHHH) is a therapeutic equine-assisted



program located in the town of Cedarburg at Black Star Farm. HHHH is volunteer driven, helping individuals of all ages grow physically and emotionally through the very real connection with specially trained horses. HHHH serves more than 65 clients in their year-round facility. Individuals with almost any cognitive, physical and/or emotional disability can benefit from purposeful, safe and supervised interaction with horses. Clients are taught to care for their horse, including grooming, saddling and unsaddling, and providing well-deserved treats after their session. Each rider takes pride in the care and love they provide the horse they ride each week.

STEWARDSHIP - THE PARABLE OF THE MUSTARD SEED

The Parable of the Mustard Seed is this year's Stewardship theme.

What happens to the seeds of time, talent and money that we spread for our Christian ministry? They grow into bounteous and beautiful things: the guidance and inspiration of Marty, Julie and the staff, the music of Sunday worship, the education and confirmation of our kids, the feeding of those in need, the changing of lives in lands far away. These small seeds grow and spread. A small piece of what we do and share does so much more than we will ever know.

We almost always do an art project which fits with the time of season or lesson, have a story and snack, play bingo, go on a scavenger hunt, bake, and just have some PLAIN OLD FUN!!!!!!

The children and families benefit from this event. Not only is it wonderful fellowship for the kids, but it strengthens the relationship between the adult helpers as well.

We are always looking for volunteers for Kids Connect. Two adult helpers are needed to run things smoothly. The volunteers would help organize art projects, hand out snacks, and assist the children where needed.

YouthConnect has several ways of being. On the first and third Sundays of the month we gather for Breakfast and Conversation at 9 am in either the church kitchen downstairs or the youth room upstairs. These breakfasts are for High School youth. YouthConnect is also a time that Jr. and Sr. High youth get together for events such as Game Nights, Escape Room, Mini-Golf and whatever events the youth themselves plan for non Sunday



morning. These events are communicated through a Group Text set up by youth as well as newsletter and email notices.

YouthConnect is designed to create and deepen the relationship of Youth of the church, friends they invite and adults such as the Ministers and mentors. Any offsite events planned must have permission slips from parents. There will always be at minimum two specified adults participating and we encourage volunteers to contact Rev. Julie to be involved in organizing, driving, and participating.




BEING GRATEFUL

The autumn season brings crisp, cool air, the colors of nature, the bounty of harvest and Thanksgiving. While we think of those things for which we are grateful, we probably don't realize how gratitude relates to our health.

Gratitude is the thankful appreciation for what an individual receives. When people acknowledge the goodness in their lives it is associated with greater happiness, optimism, and a better sense of wellbeing. When one feels these positive emotions they can generate a healthier lifestyle. Gratitude can be a buffer against the negative effects of stress; we are able to cope more ably in distressing situations. Those more mindful of benefits they have received are more likely to focus on others and connect to things beyond themselves. We demonstrate this especially at our celebration of Thanksgiving.

But what about the rest of the year? How can I be a more grateful person? Dr. Norman Rosenthal, author of Winter Blues, writes: "Some people may not be grateful by nature but it is a habit you can





- **Meditate**: focus on the present moment without judgment what you are grateful for just now (the warm sun, a piece of music, etc).
- Write a **thank-you note**: to someone who has done something you appreciate (suggested to write a note monthly); occasionally write one to yourself!
- **Pray**: for many this is the path to cultivate gratitude.

QUARTERLY BUDGET REPORT

Receipts against pledged EOG amounts remained strong in the third quarter, and expected income from EOGs remains unchanged from the end of the second quarter. Non-EOG income has continued to grow, and this income is likely to end the year significantly higher than prior expectations.

Overall expenses are tracking along according to plan, and there is currently no need to make major budget adjustments for the fourth quarter.
