Dear Friends,

At the Annual Meeting and Conference of the National Association of Congregational Christian Churches, in June, I came across a speaker who spoke of a philosophy of St. Ignatius of Loyola, a 16th century priest. I had not heard this particular phrase before (or if I had, I didn't recall), but it is something that grabbed onto me in the moment in a truly remarkable way. The phrase? 'Holy indifference.'

Now, the key to the true power of Ignatius' philosophy is the meaning he puts behind 'indifference." In his holy indifference, it is not indifference as in apathy — a 'who cares' attitude towards God. No! Instead, for Ignatius, holy indifference meant a total submission to the will and work of God in one's life. It's not, then, that we are indifferent towards God, it is that we are indifferent towards ourselves in the face of God's lead in our lives. Holy indifference, in Ignatius' philosophy, is the complete turning over of one's will towards the holy — the divine will of God.

In other words...

It's not what I think, it's what God thinks...

It's not what I expect, it's what God expects...

It's not what I want, it's what God wants...

It's not about my will or wants. To this I am indifferent that I may be wholly attuned to God's will instead.

That, for Ignatius, is holy indifference.

What truly jumped out to me about this concept, however, was that the timing of my hearing it simply could not have been any better. Over the past few months, our church leadership has been exploring a possible journey for the coming year that we have titled 75 and Beyond. With a number of transitions and systems coming into place over the past couple of years, and with our minds now looking

forward towards the arrival of our 70th anniversary in 2019, this is the perfect time for us to consider where God is leading our church in the years ahead. Imagine if, as we came upon our 70th anniversary, we had a clear and faith-filled picture of what God wanted our ministries to become for our 75th anniversary in 2024, and beyond!

That's what 75 and Beyond is all about, and that's what we will spend a good amount of time on in the 2018-2019 program year. From preaching and opportunities for Bible studies, to open dialog about current joys and future opportunities, we will dig into some of our core ministries as a church. "Dear Lord, who are we, and where are we going?"



NACCC Annual Meeting Report

The NACCC Annual Meeting in San Diego this June, was truly a remarkable confluence of people and the Holy Spirit.

As your elected delegate - I would like to share with you my experiences, and impressions, of this conference:

- * First and foremost, I had the opportunity to meet many wonderful people. The phrase, "guided by the Holy Spirit" came alive for me; moving me into many unforeseen, and deeply moving, encounters. I met some old friends, and found some new ones, and we spoke of many things of faith, the Church, our own calling and current events (immigration is a big issue in this part of the country, and a very passionate one with many attendees) that continue to touch, and hold me, to this day.
- Church revitalization was a major theme and the focal point of many of the workshops. I attended four of them and found all to be compelling and speaking to a great awareness and need for churches to undertake a heartfelt dialogue and spiritual discernment of what, indeed, is God's plan and "take the church from where it is, to where God wants it to be". The keynote address, "What Does a Healthy Church Look Like?" presented by Dr. Bill Wilson, President of The Center for Healthy Churches, was especially topical and should be on the NACCC website in the near future it is certainly worth checking-out.
- * The other three workshops I attended "The Ministry of Peacemaking", "Prophetic Preaching", and "Approaching Christian-Muslim Dialogue in the Local Church" shared common, and poignant, themes of reconciliation, trust and outreach that, in my mind at least, seemed to have a direct correlation with church renewal and revitalization.
- The new NACCC Mission Statement is, "To nurture fellowship among Congregational Christian Churches and support ministries of the local church in its community and to the world, all in the name of Christ". There was discussion of this during an evening Town Hall Meeting, with the consensus this statement placed a more appropriate, perhaps healthier, emphasis on the well-being of the local churches, with less focus on the NACCC.
- * There were several particularly fine lectures that I hope will also soon be available on the NACCC website. The Congregational Lecture by Rev. Dr. Lowell Linden spoke engagingly on the beginnings of Congregationalism in California and its early plantings from the migration of Protestant missionaries from Hawaii, through the gold rush years, and beyond. The Bible Lecture was actually a series of three separate, stimulating, presentations delivered by Dr. Terry Lindvall, and centered on Acts 1:8 ("... and you shall be my witnesses"), highlighting the "Unleashed!" theme of this conference.

As a first-timer, I found it to be very helpful to attend the First Time Attendees Orientation, which clarified (somewhat) the nature and structure of the many different boards, committees and foundations that comprise the NACCC (I couldn't help think, however, that a ready reference or glossary of commonly used organizational acronyms would be even more helpful to the uninitiated!).

I was honored to participate in this conference as your delegate and take part in the wellspring of great communion and fellowship that flowed throughout this event, from beginning to end. I would certainly encourage those who are able, to attend the 2019 NACCC in Cleveland next June.



HAPPENINGS WITH YOUTH!



HEALTH COMMITTEE



According to a recent trade report by the American Pet Products Association, 68 percent of American households now include a pet. If you are one of these 84.6 million households, you can probably attest to survey results in the same report supporting the belief that a pet can be beneficial to your own health and well-being (service animals aside, over 80% of owners surveyed view their pet as a good source of companionship, affection, stress relief and physical activity). As such, you may want to return the favor in any way you can to this valued "family member."

A growing trend among pet owners, however, has drawn the attention of consumer advocates, veterinarians, the Center For Disease Controls (CDC) and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). As many as 8.4 million people have begun purchasing and feeding their dogs and cats a pricey "back to nature" diet containing raw meat. Experts caution that this new craze is much more a result of an expensive marketing campaign than it is a health benefit for pets. The pet food industry is a booming one, with sales of \$15.3 billion alone in 2006 (and increasing steadily ever since). In fact, General Mills —maker of Cheerios cereal and Häagen-Dazs ice cream for humans—recently purchased Blue Buffalo Pet Products, hoping to capitalize on Blue Buffalo's successful dog food sales campaign suggesting that cutting carbs isn't just for humans. Raw meat-based diets, or RMBDs, are one of the fastest growing sectors of the pet food market. They are not shown to be healthier for pets.

This fad could not only be dangerous to your wallet, but worse, dangerous to your own health. A CDC food safety flyer clearly states that the "CDC does not recommend feeding raw diets to pets." Uncooked meats contain bacteria such as *E. coli*, *Salmonella*, and *Listeria*. Even if you are cautious in your handling of the food, your pets can still transfer bacteria from their mouths and paws to you, and possibly when you pet them. Additionally, dogs fed raw dog food "shed 23 times more *Salmonella* organisms [in their waste] than other dogs." Cats and dogs that consume raw meat diets are also more likely to become infected with antibiotic-resistant bacteria than animals on more conventional diets. The UC-Davis Veterinary School, too, has stated, "We do not recommend the feeding of raw animal products . . . and these types of diets are not allowed in the Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital per Infectious Disease Control Policy."

There are many other ways to "share the love" with your four-legged friend: take your dog for walks; read the paper while sitting on the couch with your cat; give your pet the occasional—cooked!—table scrap; and if you simply must, ok, go ahead and wear matching Halloween costumes. While pet food companies continue to market raw foods—what one company calls Biologically Appropriate Raw Foods—consider carefully the unfortunate acronym formed by those four words!
