Dear Friends,

At Christmas, when we talk about the incarnation, we often come across John 1:18, "No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known." It is a simple and clear reminder that a core aspect of the incarnation was that Jesus, in his person and ministry, was a window into the heart and character of God. In the life, ministry, death and resurrection of Jesus, we were given a reflection of the Divine reality. In Jesus, we saw just a glimpse of who and what God is — which is precisely what we will be exploring throughout Lent this year.

God is Grace...God is Peace..God is Strength...the list goes on. Beginning with an introductory sermon on March 3, and carrying from Ash Wednesday on March 6 through Easter morning, our worship life will walk us through these characteristics of God that were revealed in the life and ministry of Jesus. As we explore the nature of God through the window of the person of Jesus, however, we are going to take it one step further.

Jesus commissioned his disciples to go out and minister in his name. Paul named the Church as the body of Christ – the ongoing presence of the life and ministry of Jesus in this world. So, if we are going to talk about the nature of God that was revealed in the person of Jesus, we are also going to need to spend some time exploring how we might do that ourselves – and yes, some time actually doing it!

- ❖ When we talk about God as peace, there will be both physical and digital opportunities to share quotes and thoughts about the meaning of peace – as well as thoughts and ideas about how to live it out.
- When we talk about God as Strength, we will decorate small crosses and write notes of care and prayer that our Hosanna team will take with them on the mission trip in June.

Passing it on cont...

- * When we talk about God as Mercy, we will gather for a Reconciliation Worship during which time we will embrace the mercy we know in God and thoughtfully consider those places we might need to offer the same to others.
- * We will have gatherings to hear about mission work by our own members, hear about local missions and work on projects to their benefit.
- And, throughout the season, there will be weekly Bible studies on Wednesday nights and Thursday mornings in which we will explore, together, the central passage of Scripture for the upcoming Sunday.

For the next 2 months, we will find ourselves engaged in the theme, "Pass it on." What we learn of God in the person and ministry of Jesus, we pass on in the very life and ministry we embrace today. I hope you will join us taking the time to be a part of some of the unique opportunities that are outlined for this Lenten season, and I look forward to exploring, together, the nature of God that was revealed in Jesus and lives through us today.




EDUCATION AND FORMATION OPPORTUNITIES



"BEING MORTAL"

The Health Committee invites you:

Plan to stay after worship on Sunday, March 17, for a light lunch and viewing of "Being



Mortal," the film based on the book by Atul Gawande in which he explores the dilemmas medical procedures can present as individuals have age related frailty, serious illness and are approaching death. It is also a call for a change in the philosophy of health care. Gawande writes that members of the medical profession, himself included, have been wrong about what their job is. Rather than ensuring health and survival, it is "to enable well-being."

By using actual patient and physician accounts, he shares with the viewer a sense of exactly what he means. In a society that values independence, what happens when that is no longer possible? We need to reckon with the reality of the body's eventual decline, he argues, think about what matters most to us, and adapt our society and medical profession to help people achieve that.

The film/dvd runs 60 minutes and the light lunch will be served during the movie. In keeping with the date, March 17, expect a lunch with a nod to the Irish in all of us. The topic of this film often sparks a need for additional discussion. We'll provide the opportunity to arrange further discussion at another date. Gather after worship in Fellowship Hall. If you're interested in reading

the book, there is a copy in the church library. Additionally, both the DVD and the book are available in many local libraries.

2019 HOSANNA MISSION TRIP



Are you ready to Take care of God's business this year by being a part of the Hosanna Mission Team?

Before you answer that question, please read this Common Application Essay submitted to the University of Wisconsin by high school senior Lindsey Schimpf...by the way, there was no coaching from Mom or Dad on this!

The sun is beating down on my face. Sweat is trickling down my back. My lower half is dragging me down from the weight of jeans and heavy work boots. My lips thirst for a refreshing swig of ice cold water straight from my jug. I am fatigued, and thinking about the long nap I will be taking on the trek back to the dormitory. But thinking of these circumstances brings a smile to my face because in the end, all of the hard work pays off. Mission trips are an aspect of my life that holds great value due to the power of strengthening faith and friendships, learning experiences, and bringing more meaning into my life.

Hosanna Industries is the heart of what makes each mission trip run smoothly. Hosanna Industries is a non-profit organization stationed in Rochester, Pennsylvania. Their mission statement is that "when every family lives in dignity, every roof is tight, and every furnace burns safely; when no one goes to sleep cold or hungry or scared; when every child has a yard and a kitchen and a bed- then we'll put down our hammers and demonstrate our faith in some other way. Until then, the green trucks are heading down the road to the next project." The first mission trip I went on was in 2012 with my church, and I had no clue what to expect. The end result: I loved the trip, and I have been going every year since. Each trip allows me to establish a powerful rapport with everyone involved including the workers, youth from churches around the Ozaukee area, older people apart of the congregation, and even God. Going through extensive laborious work and traveling over 15 hours in many 12- passenger vans never fails to be the highlight of my summer.

At Hosanna Industries, the workers put great emphasis on the three S's, which are a glorified set of rules they teach volunteers in order to have the most successful work sites possible. The first S is safety. This primary S is very straight-forward, for everything that is done on a work site has to be a safe environment void of any possible danger. For example, if a person is carrying a two-by-four, it is necessary to make sure that nobody is going to get whacked by the piece of wood. Also, every ladder must have someone standing at the feet in case of the occurrence of an accident. The next S is sensitivity. The projects that Hosanna work on are for people of the lower class who

either cannot afford getting their house fixed and/or are physically unable to do so; therefore, through the second S the workers inform volunteers to be careful of what they say while being on the worksite. Because volunteers often come from backgrounds where the problem of being unable to fix their house are out of the picture, it is important that volunteers are aware of their surroundings and to see what problems other people actually face in the real world. This is to prevent a situation in which a volunteer would negatively describe the condition of a house right in front of the homeowner who had been living in that situation for several years. The last S is spirit. Of course it is necessary to obtain spirit on a mission trip! Volunteers are told to be positive and reflect the spirit of the Lord; we are doing God's work. Everything is to be held in a fruitful manner with energy and gusto. Knowing the specifics of the three S's, these rules affect me outside of the mission trip. Safety is always a given in life: never run with scissors, always buckle your seatbelt, ect. However, sensitivity and spirit have stuck with me the most. Seeing people from Pennsylvania and West Virginia struggle and ask for the help of Hosanna has made me reflect on my own life. Everyday people around me have their own baggage that is not visible to the eye. People around me are in dire need of a helping hand. Knowing this, it is a goal of mine to lead a life with sensitivity because it is the least I can do for people around me wrestling with their problems. In addition, due to these mission trips, I believe to live a better more fulfilling life I must have spirit. With a strong spirit, everything comes easy and feels more complete, so personally I aim to do SO.

On top of applying key characteristics into my real life, mission trips reveal aspects about myself that I would not have known before. In the past seventeen years of my life, I have gotten a good idea of who I am as a person. However, whenever I am asked what I want to do in my life, I freeze up. Thinking back on my mission trips, I have an idea of the direction I want to go in. The service of working with Hosanna is just amazing; therefore, I know I want to help others when I grow up. The satisfaction of serving other people is indescribable, and I am very passionate about it. Nothing would make me happier and more fulfilled to help those in need. Hosanna has also allowed me to get out of my comfort zone. Before my first trip to Pennsylvania, I had never been involved in siding a house, insulating a basement, or even chopping down and dragging trees three times my height. Nonetheless, I went and experienced countless means of hard labor. If I was never put in those situations, I would never have found what I truly enjoy. Taking a step back, I realize that it takes hard work, no matter what the form, in order to obtain a end result that you are proud of. All in all, Hosanna has pushed me in the direction of the person I want to become in the future.


